



Minutes

President James McGuffick called the meeting to order at 10:10 AM. There were 20 attendees including Kurt Tiefenthaler, a modeler introduced by Justin Camarata. James informed the membership that he had to leave early, and that VP Tom Szabo would take over. There was no "Zoom" at this meeting.

The Annual Northeast Ship Model Conference was discussed. The Peoples Choice Award (PCA), will be continued and will be given in 3 categories with one winner per category. Those categories are Power, Sail and Other. Bob Siegler raised the possibility of having a Modelers' Choice Award. He suggested this award should be voted on strictly by participating club members and/or attending modelers. No decision was made. It was agreed that ballots need to be strictly tabulated to avoid any "issues" that have arisen in the past. Several other topics were discussed including giving Junior Awards to those under the age of 12. It was agreed that the entrance fee for attendees at the April, 2024 conference will be held at \$45.00/person for attendees, \$10.00 for general public admission, and no charge for those under 12. Model entry information will be entered on a separate page as in the past with the standard instructions. Various workshop suggestions were discussed. It was decided workshops should be scheduled to prevent one from overlapping another as has happened before. Both front and rear entrances to the "Port and Starboard" will be covered to ensure entry fees are collected. Raffle prizes were discussed, but no decision was made. James informed us that Nick from Blue Jacket Models will be the speaker at the conference. It was agreed upon by all that speakers should be limited to 30 minutes. Membership dues of \$25.00 will be due at the next meeting. Anyone not paying up will be keel hauled!

The December 9th meeting will be a breakfast meeting at Twin Pines Diner.

Vice President Tom Szabo took over the meeting at 11:30. The meeting was closed at 11:50.



Jan Van Speijk commanded gunboat number 2 and patrolled the Scheldt River near Antwerp stopping and inspecting vessels leaving and entering the Port of Antwerp. Jon told us the story of

Relation presented two models, a.) Robert Fulton's 1802 steamboat *Clermont*, and b.) the *USS*



Thresher. The Clermont model was built from a 1960 ITC kit in 1:87 scale. It sold then for the outrageous" price of \$1.98! Rick purchased the model in 1978 and figured it was time to build it. The biggest challenge was determining what were the colors of the original Clermont. No photos exist of it, so he looked the model up on the web and found several models painted differently. Rick settled on this particular scheme " 'cause it looked good! Besides, who's going to say it's wrong??"

The USS Thresher SSN 593, is a Blue Water Models1:350 scale, cast in resin with plastic diving planes and rudders. The prop is photo etched. The USS Thresher was the lead boat of a new, super-sophisticated class of

fast attack boats. Tragically the
Thresher was lost with all hands in
April, 1963 off Portsmouth, NH in
8,400 feet of water due to the failure
of a weld in a pipe between the outer
and pressure hulls. After her loss,
Adm. Hyman Rickover initiated the
"Sub Safe" policy to be sure this
would never happen again. Rick's

oward Miller demonstrated his model of a *carfloat*, in HO scale.

Carfloats were used extensively in New York Harbor by numerous railroads such as the New Haven, Pennsylvania, New York Central, Reading, etc. The floats were moved around by railroad owned tugs.



With the demise of industry and shifts in rail traffic patterns, all of these operations in NY Harbor are gone except for the NY Cross Harbor RR which is now the NY-NJ RR. The floating is between Bayonne, NJ and Brooklyn, NY.

Howard scratch-built his carfloat model from plywood, adding tracks and placing cars on it. He said he displays it on a shelf. Guess not enough water in his house to float it.


d Petrucci showed us his scratch-built *Santa Maria*.
