

Paul Goldberg: The **Royal Yacht Duchess of Kingston** kit in 1/64 scale by Vanguard Models. Paul indicated there are 250 steps to construct this plank on bulkhead model. Paul attended the meeting via Zoom.



JOHN ELWOOD: Scratch-built model by Lou Chagnon of **CG-36418** a 36 foot USCG rescue craft. It is an identical model of the CG-36500 which played an incredible role in the rescue of 30+ survivors from the tanker Pendleton which broke in half and sank off Chatham, MA in a vicious winter storm in 1952. The 36500 was designed to carry 12! To date, it is considered by many to be the greatest rescue in USCG history.



L SAUBERMANN: The **James A. Miller** in 1/192 scale, was a 3 masted schooner built in Essex, CT in 1854 on the Connecticut River.



Revell 1/450 scale Queen Elizabeth 2. Model completely airbrushed with Tru-Color paints. The model represents how she looked after being converted from steam-turbines to diesel electric, and with penthouse staterooms added. The price per person for a penthouse was \$2000.00 PER DAY!

The QE2, as she was known, was built on the Clyde in Scotland by John Brown & Sons Ltd. Ironically, her conversion was done by Blohm & Voss Shipyard in Hamburg Germany where the Bismarck was built.
